What's the Challenge?

This summer, join the Summer Reading Bingo adventure! Students will choose a book from the list provided by Mrs. Nugent and complete a fun Bingo challenge for exciting rewards.

Whether you're reading for fun, stretching your thinking with nonfiction, or aiming for the full board — there's something for everyone!

Basic Guidelines

- Students must choose books from Mrs. Nugent's approved list.
 - Please do not choose books that you have read before.
- Books may be purchased or borrowed from the public library.
- Students must read the book. Audio books are not permitted.
- For each book read, students must write a 4-6 sentence paragraph explaining their favorite part.
- A parent must sign and date the paragraph to confirm completion.
- Completed Bingo boards and book responses are due on the first day of school.

PARENTS-About the Book List

The attached book list is **exhaustive**, meaning all book choices for the summer assignment must come from it. However, we recognize that every child is unique in their maturity and understanding. You, as the parent, have the final say in what is appropriate for your child.

We encourage you to:

- Review the book list with your student.
- Talk through what titles might interest them.
- Help guide them to a book that is age-appropriate and aligns with your family's values. A few resources that are helpful are

- Encourage them to choose a book they will feel confident and successful in completing.

Challenge Levels & Rewards

- Option 1: Read 1 Book (Any type from Mrs. Nugent's book list)
 - Complete one Bingo row (sideways, vertical, or diagonal).
 - Choose 3 Specialty Passes
 - Finish the entire Bingo board for a **Dinner Out on Mrs. Nugent**
- Option 2: Read 1 Nonfiction + 1 Fiction Book (Any type from Mrs. Nugent's book list)
 - Complete two separate Bingo rows (one per book).
 - Earn 6 Specialty Passes
 - Finish both full boards for a **Dinner Out on Mrs. Nugent**
- Option 3: Read 2 Nonfiction Books (Any type from Mrs. Nugent's book list)
 - Complete two separate Bingo rows (one per book).
 - Earn 7 Specialty Passes
 - Finish both full boards for a **Dinner Out on Mrs. Nugent**

Specialty Pass Options (subject to availability)

★ How to Submit

- 1. Complete your Bingo row(s) by reading and meeting location or challenge goals.
- 2. Write your 4–6 sentence paragraph about your favorite part of the book.
- 3. Have a parent/guardian **sign and date** the paragraph.
- 4. Bring your signed paragraph(s) and completed Bingo board(s) to school **on the first day**! Be sure your **name** appears on all papers and they are stapled together.

Support your reader by helping them stick to a reading routine, visit the library regularly, or even read alongside them! Let's make summer reading fun, creative, and rewarding.

(Set during the Red Scare; encourages moral thinking and courage)

Themes of poverty, hope, and quiet perseverance

Yolonda's Genius by Carol Fenner (1996 Honor) Urban setting, family loyalty, and strong female lead

The Watsons Go to Birmingham – 1963 by Christopher Paul Curtis Historical context with humor; thoughtful but age-appropriate

Moccasin Trail by Eloise Jarvis McGraw Identity, frontier life, and cross-cultural themes

Turtle in Paradise by Jennifer L. Holm Great Depression setting; layered but accessible

Letters from Rifka by Karen Hesse Immigration story with rich cultural and emotional insight
